NEW SERVICE: HOMEBOUND DELIVERY



Do you, or someone you know, have physical limitations that prevent you from leaving home?

The Durham Public Library now has a Homebound Delivery Service. This Service is a free service to any resident of Durham who is unable to visit the library because of a temporary or permanent disability. Call the library to receive a physical copy or go to our website to fill out the online application. Within the application you will be able to choose what interests you as far as genre and type of material: Books, Large Print Books, Books on CD, DVD's, CD's, Magazines. A library staff member will then choose items using the application as a guideline. A specific item can also be requested. You can borrow up to 25 items.

After the application is received someone will contact you about delivery. All of this information and more can be found on our website:





Diana recommends "A Walk Across the Sun" by Corban Addison



I would describe this book as a thriller. It tackles the tough topic of Child Sex Trafficking. It is a hard topic, that is handled tastefully. The main characters are two sisters, 17 year old Ahalya and 15 year old Sita. The other main character is Thomas Clark, an attorney, who becomes entwined in their story. What I liked about the book was how the two storylines came together. It was a page turner with plenty of action. This book also brings attention to a serious issue that is happening in the world today.

Kim recommends "Mrs. Everything" by Jennifer Weiner



This story follows two sisters, Jo and Bethie, as they navigate life from the 1950's to the present, experiencing the same upbringing, but ending up in very different places. The oldest, Jo, is practical and bends to society's expectations. Bethie, the younger of the two, is a romantic, whose life doesn't unfold as she imagined. As the story moves from 1950's to 1970's it tackles divorce, women's changing expectations, interracial marriage, and what it really means to be happy. The book includes multiple viewpoints and readers who like a family saga and characters that feel like friends will appreciate this book. Check it out and let Kim know what you think!

Christine recommends "The Bride Test" by Helen Hoang I tend to read either serious nonfiction or light romance – this book is definitely the latter! A follow-up to the best-selling The Kiss Quotient, The Bride Test is a sweet and funny Cinderella story about Khai Diep, who has autism and thinks he doesn't "do" relationships, and Esme Tran, the woman Khai's mother fixes him up with. Recommended for fans of contemporary romantic comedies with heart.



The Year We Fell From Space by Amy Sarig King

This book delves into the topics of divorce and mental health with an honest and open viewpoint. The main character, Liberty, struggles to understand her father's depression and also take stock of her own mental well-being. In The Year We Fell From Space, King creates an achingly realistic experience of divorce and the impact of depression on a family that ends on an equally realistic, yet hopeful note.

Pokko and the Drum by Matthew Forsythe

In this sweet and funny picture book, Pokko is a frog who is bothering his family with his loud drumming. Kids and parents will both relate and appreciate Pokko's persistence and the fun that follows.

Early Literacy Kits

As part of the Every Child Ready to Read program, the library has developed circulating "literacy kits" that support early literacy practices. Each kit contains: 2 board books 5 picture books a music CD an educational DVD or toy an idea packet of pre-reading activities that parents and children can do together Kits circulate for 3 weeks; there is a \$1.00 per day fine for late returns.

You can pay your fines online!

Click on "Log Into My Account"

Type your last name and patron ID number (on your library card)

On the left side under your personal information there will be a link that says "\$1.15 in unpaid fines and bills" (The amount is dependent on how much you owe. If you currently owe no fines, this link will not be there at all. You must have at least \$1.01 in fines to pay online.)

Click on that link to access payment screen.

Click "Pay Now"

A pop-up window will come up and you can check boxes next to each fine you would like to pay. Click contine. Enter your Visa, Discover, or Mastercard number, select the type, and enter the expiration date. Click "continue". On the final screen you will need to input your card's security code and billing information before clicking "I Authorize This Transaction" to finalize your payment.
