Durham Public Library Receives State Grant for Space Revitalization

The Durham Public Library is extremely pleased to report that we have been awarded a grant for \$146,957 by the Connecticut State Library Board that will fund updates to the library interior.

There have been numerous changes in technology and community needs since the last significant library updates in 1995. The grant funding will allow the library to upgrade the public computers and reconfigure the interior space with two small study rooms, quiet reading areas, and new furnishings for the circulation and teen spaces. Lastly, the revitalization project will enable the library to complete long needed maintenance projects, including adding an automatic front door, redoing the main floor restrooms, and repainting and carpeting the space. The grant award culminates a strategic planning process that involved both library patrons and the community at large.

"This project is an important part of making the Library responsive to the community," notes Library Director Christine Michaud. "The new study rooms and the automatic doors, in particular, are frequently requested by our patrons, and it is important to keep up with technological changes." She continued, "This remodeling plan is part of our mission of growing knowledge and community. With this project, we are positioning the library to continue to meet community needs in the 21st century, while keeping the charm and character that make the Durham Public Library so special."

"The State Library grant will cover 50% of the project costs and the remainder must be matched by contributions from the Town and the community. "Our next phase is fundraising to meet this goal," Board Chair, Robert H. Booz stressed. Look for more information soon on how you can contribute to this exciting project.





This alternate history light-heartedly reimagines the story of the unfortunately fated "Nine Days Queen" Lady Jane Grey. In a fantastical version of sixteenth-century England, bookish Jane is forced into an arranged marriage and caught up in a scheme to take the throne from her cousin King Edward VI. But when the plan goes wrong, hijinks ensue as Jane struggles to avoid losing her head (literally). Maybe in this version, she'll finally get her happy ending. This book is both hilarious and romantic. Enjoyable for both teens and adults, it's the perfect book to put the reader in a good mood.

Five years after the Civil War Captain Jefferson Kidd crosses paths with a ten year old held captive by the Kiowa. He agrees to see her safely across Texas where she will be reunited with her family. Along the way, the unlikely companions meet interesting people, harsh conditions, and dangerous situations. Did I mention the young girl only speaks Kiowa? I loved how the author was able to show how two people can learn from one another and develop a bond despite the often one-sided conversations. This short novel is part western, part historical fiction, but ultimately the tale of a family. The movie was just released starring Tom Hanks. See the movie, but read the book first!

Jennifer recommends "The Vanishing Half" by Brit Bennett This relevant, yet historical, fiction follows the lives of identical twin sisters, Stella and Desiree, as they grow up in a small town in Louisiana in the 1950's. The girls are so light skinned, they could pass for white. Their roads diverge when Stella takes an opportunity to live her life as a white woman, leaving Desiree, and their lives as black women and twins, behind. This book follows the twins, and then their daughters, as they make their way in the world separately. It covers a wide range of topics (race, gender, class...) which makes it the perfect book club pick!


