Library Renewal Will Prepare Us for the Years Ahead

We've been listening! Over the years, members of the public have shared what they love about the library and what areas could use an update. In 2014 and 2016, over 400 Durham residents participated in two community surveys. In addition to the print and media collections, you identified community gathering spaces and access

to technology as community priorities. You also identified several barriers to meeting those needs, most notably the noise level and the lack of defined spaces for quiet study, small meetings, and community gathering. The Library Renewal project is our response to that feedback. This project will reconfigure the interior space with two small study rooms, quiet reading areas, new furnishings for the circulation and teen spaces, and update the public computing areas. Lastly, the renewal project will enable the library to complete long needed maintenance projects, including adding an automatic front door, redoing the main floor restrooms, and repainting and carpeting the space.

Now we need your help. Two-thirds of the project cost will be covered by a generous grant from the Connecticut State Library and from Town of Durham capital funds. In order to receive the grant funds, however, we must raise the remaining third of the funds by October 2021. 


Cassie lives with her parents, works at a local coffee shop, and has a secret life at night. One day, she discovers an opportunity to avenge a traumatic event that happened in the past...





Elizabeth B recommends "Axiom's End" by Lindsay Ellis



It's 2007, and all Cora Sabino wants is to not mess up her new temp job and to avoid association with her estranged whistleblower father. But then it turns out that he was right: the government actually has been covering up extraterrestrial presence on Earth for decades. Soon Cora becomes the one person who can communicate between humans and their otherworldly visitors. But although she can literally interpret what the strangers are saying, she questions whether she truly understands what they want and what it means for her own world. In this exciting first-contact novel, it is never clear just who is telling the truth, who is lying, and what they are covering up. Jen recommends "Think Again: The Power of Knowing What You Don't " by Adam Grant



This was my first time reading a book by this author and I listened to audio version from Libby. I really liked hearing the author read it - it reminded me of a really engaging podcast. My main take away was to not be afraid to admit when your wrong, actively seek out information that goes against your own views and work on improving yourself (rather than proving yourself). This book felt very relevant given the state of the country with very polarizing viewpoints on so many topics. Being able to hear and understand others with opposing viewpoints from your own can only make you grow as a person and can help foster that mindset in others.

Diana recommends "Keeping Faith" By Jodi Picoult This book kept me riveted from the first page to the last. The story focuses on a mother, Mariah, and her daughter, Faith, who are dealing with Mariah's broken marriage from Colin, Faith's father. Faith acquires an imaginary friend, her "guard" due to the break up. After Faith seems to have performed some "miracles", there is some speculation "guard" is actually "God". There is a media frenzy around Mariah's house, and the story moves through how Mariah protects Faith. Its interesting to see how the different characters in the book view Faith. There is suspense and a love story, all wrapped up in the question: Is God working through Faith? I loved the end of the book, with a bit of a twist.
