
Where the Animals Go by James Cheshire 591.479 CHESHIRE

As the total solar eclipse led to a mass exodus in Northern New England, I began to draw similarities between the long drives people endured to other animal migration patterns focused around the sun. The thought led me to an old favorite, Where the Animals Go. Using advanced tracking technology, the data in this book disproves some previous theories on animal behaviors, confirms others, and introduces us to the well kept until recent, secret treks of wildlife. This beautiful bildungsroman follows Francie Nolan and her family in Brooklyn during the early 20th century. Its hard to describe the book without giving away major plot points, but its beauty comes from the descriptions of Francie and the Nolan family's hopes, struggles, successes, and failures in the face of crushing poverty. It's a gorgeous snapshot of pre-WWI life, yet it also reflects universal experiences of life and growing up.

Based on real art figures from the 1980s, Anita de Monte Laughs Last deals with issues of memory, power, and art. A compelling page turner that I couldn't put down.
