SIGNIFICANCE	In 1861 David Camp built a 2½ story, post-and-beam-framed house. The building has an asphalt-shingledgable-to-street roof and rests on a mortared sandstone block foundation. In 1857, a 1 acre lot of land was purchased by David and Laura Camp from David Smith. A carpenter by trade, David Camp built his own house. The tax records point to the year of construction; from 1857 to 1869 Camp is listed as owning 1 acre of land valued at \$100.00 but no houses. One year later a house is included with the same acre with a total value of \$300.00 The Camp House is noteworthy because it was built by David Camp, who comes from a Durham family who were prominent carpenters throughout the nineteenth century.
